講師のクリストフ・ヘンドリックス博士は、アルゼンチン在住のベルギー人である。専門は、恐竜の化石である。













研修の様子 (11/12)






チェン氏からは、ゲームを人々が本当につながれる場所、絆を強められる場所、そして本当の自分でいられる 場所にしようとされているというお話を聞き、生徒たちは感銘を受けていた。水谷氏には、オーディオ・デザイ ンの奥深さについて、実際のゲーム映像を交えながら、英語でご講演いただいた。世界観を大切にしつつプレイ ヤーにとって遊びやすい配慮がされており、生徒たちはオーディオ・デザインに込められた思いやゲームとプレ イヤーへの愛情を感じていた。また、英語と日本語で質疑応答が行われ、大いに盛り上がった。





5. GSO および最後のセッションでの発表の様子

GSO では様々なトピックが取り扱われ、生徒たちはそれらに関する自分の意見を英語で表現したり、他の人の 意見を聞いて考えたりしてきた。時には自分の考えをうまく表現できず、もどかしい思いや悔しさを感じること もあった。しかし、講師の先生方のサポートを受けながら戦い続け、科学的コミュニケーション力を高めること ができた。最後の GSO では、自分の好きなことや情熱を注いでいるものについてプレゼンテーションを英語で 行った。生徒たちは、GSO で鍛えた、伝える力を存分に発揮した。また、トークセッションやオンライン研修で 知った、好きなものを好きと言えることの大切さや、好きなものに情熱を注ぐ姿の美しさを、自分たちのプレゼ ンテーションを通して示してくれた。



Encountering the Unknown

Tsubaki Hamada

I participated in this program because I wanted to improve my English skills and also broaden my horizons. SSHs are known for their science programs, so as a humanities major, I was learning a field that was largely unknown to me. I was very anxious about whether I would be able to keep up with the SSH program because of my devastating lack of ability in science subjects, but I participated in this program because I thought it would be a challenge to be exposed to research in a different field. Furthermore, since I am aiming to go on to an overseas university, I thought that the talk session in English would be good practice for my future, when I will probably have to attend classes in English.

When it came time for the overseas training program to begin, it was a series of unknowns that exceeded my expectations. The group I was in was good because it was about the humanities, but the other group's topics were all in the sciences, especially medicine, and they were all about words and events I had never seen or heard. However, contrary to my expectations, the people in the group explained words I did not understand or put them in terms that were easier to understand, until we all understand them. So I was able to show interest in what they were doing, and gradually I became more aware that I was a member of the program with everyone else.

At GSO, I had discussions with many teachers on different topics each time, and we acknowledged each other's opinions. They took our opinions seriously and sometimes asked detailed questions about our view, so we had to have our own opinions and present them with confidence, even if they might be wrong. In every discussion I learned something new. I remember a topic "What is freedom?" Everyone had a different opinion, and some expressed opinions exactly opposite of each other. In that moment, we learned the importance of having our own opinions about things we don't know, and of not letting them go unspoken.

We encountered many unknowns in each of the talk sessions. However, the lecturers incorporated visual information such as diagrams and pictures to make them easy to understand even for those of us who were completely new to the field.

In summary, the overseas training gave me a lot. It gave me a sense of accomplishment in creating a project with my teammates, a flexibility in thinking that allows me to listen to and accept the opinions of others, and above all, a lot of new knowledge that I had never known before. I would not have gained all this knowledge had I not participated in this program, so I can confidently say that I am happy to have participated in this wonderful program.

Finally I would like to end my report by thanking the teachers who guided us during our overseas training, the GSO teachers, and all the lecturers who willingly agreed to appear in our talk sessions.

Through the Program of USING English

Participating in the Overseas Study Program has brought about many changes in me. I originally joined this program to improve my skills in "using" English and to broaden my horizons, and throughout the year, there could not have been a better opportunity to achieve these goals.

During the talk sessions, I was able to speak with Mr. Hendrickx, Ms. Ikarashi, and Mr. Chen and Mr. Mizutani. I don't think I would have been able to participate in the sessions as proactively as I did without this program, and I don't think I would have been able to ask questions or moderate the sessions. Personally, the talk session with Mr. Chen and Mr. Mizutani was particularly impressive. I was one of the moderators and was able to experience a job that required flexibility. During the talk session, I almost made a mistake due to my own carelessness, but all the members supported me and we managed to proceed smoothly. Everyone's kindness at that time calmed me down, and I'm very grateful for that. In addition, I think that the talk session helped me acquire not only English language skills but also the skills to think of questions and ask them questions related to what was said in the presentation. I saw other students were able to relate the questions they thought of to the presentation, and I kept that in mind and was able to do it myself.

I also think that GSO helped me improve my use of English as a means of communication. The teachers listened to what each student tried to say, corrected any mistakes, asked questions to deepen the conversation, and gave us hints on how to speak in English. We hear English, our non-native language, and we respond in English. It is natural that a perfect response is difficult. Rather, it is about how confident you are in your English, how much you can express your desire to communicate, and how much you can try to communicate. I think this is the point in which I grew most in GSO and one of the most important points in our attempt to speak a foreign language.

After completing the program, I'm proud that I took a step forward and joined the program and that I made it through the whole year. One decision I made in my first year of high school has made a huge difference to me.

We will face many decisions in the future. Participating in the program gave me the courage to take the first step. And it taught me about English as a means of communication. I would like to conclude by expressing my greatest appreciation and respect to all the teachers involved in this program, to everyone who participated in the talk sessions, and to all the members who worked so hard together for a year to make it through the program.

What I Liked About This Program

I decided to participate in this program because I wanted to go to America. I wanted to go to a foreign university and experience studying abroad. However, due to the coronavirus, I was not able to go. I was very sad when I found out that I could not go to the US. However, I did have some useful experiences throughout the year, and I think I grew a lot as a result.

The first one was GSO. This was a program designed to help students learn to speak English abroad, and it consists of speaking with about 4 teachers in English. I was very tired at the beginning because I had to speak English for about two hours. However, I got used to it after speaking many times, and my pronunciation got better and better. The teachers were kind and funny, which made me like English even more. I also needed to improve my English skills because I was planning to apply to a university overseas. I was not very good at speaking, so I had a lot of trouble at first. However, I was able to improve my speaking ability and get a perfect score in the GTEC. This helped me a lot.

The second was the talk sessions, in which we directly asked researchers or companies to give a lecture in the field we were interested in. We held three talk sessions, and now I will write about the first one, because I hosted it and I will write about it in detail. First of all, I am interested in dinosaurs and other paleontological organisms, and I was thinking of studying paleontology in university in the future. So I thought I would ask Mr. Christophe Hendrickx, who actually studies dinosaurs in Argentina, to give a lecture. I wrote an email in English and sent it to him. He immediately sent me an email agreeing to give a lecture. After two months of meetings with him, we were able to have the lecture remotely. He spoke slowly and used a lot of slides so that I could understand his lecture. I also appreciated the time he gave us to ask questions individually after the lecture. There were quite a few students who attended the lecture. The media also came to the lecture, so I think it was a pretty big event. This experience can only be had at Tsuyama High School, so anyone interested in overseas and research should definitely participate!

What I Learnt From This Program

Yoshiharu Kobayashi

As for myself, I have learned many things during the year through this training program. I was not good at English at first, and I was not used to the English used by native speakers, and I did not have good listening and speaking skills. I have been able to listen to a wide variety of English from different English-speaking countries. What I felt was that the same English can be completely different depending on the country you come from. Therefore, I think it was a good thing that I was given the opportunity to be exposed to English from various countries.

Next, I would like to talk about the talk sessions. We had three talk sessions in total, and when I participated in the first one on fossils, I found that my English was not at all practical. I remember that the other student used a lot of technical terms, but even excluding them, I could not understand what I needed to understand. The second talk session was with a Japanese speaker. It was indeed a difficult subject, but I was able to understand enough to be able to broaden my interpretation of English from the first session to the second session. The third talk was given by the creators of a game that I play, Sky, and they were concerned that we were not fluent in English, so they responded in Japanese even though they were from overseas.

Through each of these experiences, I learned something. Through the GSO activities, I have learned that it is important to express your thoughts clearly and to use your English well even if you are not good at it. I think I have learned through this year that if my English skills are not good enough, I should use gestures. And what I lack in English, I should make up for with something else, instead of just using English for all conversations.

What I Learned in the Program

Seitaro Sakate

I have gained many things through this program. These are mainly communication skills, bonds with fellow students who have shared the hardships of the program, and, of course, improving my own English ability.

Due to the coronavirus, I was not able to travel to the U.S. this time, but there was an activity called GSO, in which English speaking teachers came to the school every two weeks and spoke English for about two hours. I was very anxious about whether I would be able to speak English properly with the teachers in GSO, but when I got stuck or had trouble understanding a word, the teachers helped me out and taught me what to say. I was not so good at English, but I was able to participate in the discussions with confidence. I was also able to improve my English skills through long conversations in English with the teachers, which is something I could not do in school.

In the online talk sessions, students were divided into groups according to their areas of interest, and each group sent an e-mail to the person they wanted to talk to. As a result, three online talk sessions were held. Some of the talks were very technical, and we could not understand everything perfectly. However, we were able to have a very productive time thanks to the fact that we had done our own research and thought of questions about what was going to be talked about beforehand, and the people who gave talks spoke in a way that was easy for us to understand.

Although I felt that participating in the program kept me very busy and was very demanding at times, I really gained a lot from it and had many valuable experiences.

Precious Experience in This Program

I decided to participate in this program because I wanted to improve my English. I had never studied English properly, so I was worried about whether I would do well when I participated in this program. I was also concerned that I might not be able to do as many activities as I wanted because of the coronavirus. When I participated in the program, I realized that my English skills were not good enough. So I decided to study English properly, and my motivation to learn English increased.

This training program includes a program called GSO, where you can speak with people from overseas in English. I had rarely spoken to people from English-speaking countries, so I could not express what I wanted to say at all. However, as I went through the GSOs, I was able to speak English much better than I could at first. Also, GSOs are about two hours long each time, so you will be very tired after completing them. However, the instructors prepared interesting stories and topics for each GSO, so I was able to enjoy the GSO.

In this program, we mainly prepared emails to be sent to people we would like to talk to at the talk sessions. This was a chance to talk to people I would never talk to under normal circumstances, so I took the plunge and sent an email to Mark Zuckerberg, although I did not receive a reply.

About the talk sessions, we were lucky enough to have two talk sessions, the first one was with Mr. Hendrickx, who is a dinosaur researcher. The second talk was given by Mr. Chen and Mr. Mizutani of "thatgamecompany". They are involved in the development of the world-famous "Sky" game, and they spoke passionately about Sky and its sound.

We also had the opportunity to hear from MIT student Ms. Yuka Ikarashi. I have always wanted to be involved in the field of information engineering, so it was a very valuable experience for me to hear directly from someone who is on the cutting edge of the field. It was refreshing to hear from someone who has actually gone on to graduate school overseas, and it broadened my international perspective.

I was sad when I was informed halfway through the program that I would no longer be going to the U.S., but I think the value of this program more than made up for it. I gained many things from the program, such as speaking skills that I could not have developed just by studying English normally, and the chance to have talk sessions with people I was interested in.

I still cannot speak English fluently at all. However, this program has given me the motivation to keep working hard in English. I will make the most of this experience in my future.

What Made Me Grow A Lot

The main activities during the program are GSOs and workshops. GSO is an opportunity to gather on Fridays for two hours to talk with four GSO teachers.

I didn't know much about dinosaurs, so it was difficult for me to understand his lecture in English. But I enjoyed watching him give his enthusiastic lecture with his love for dinosaurs.

The second talk was from a company called "thatgamecompany". They talked about the audio of their game "Sky", and I understood the attention that the creators paid to the game. They varied the footsteps and background music according to the movements of the characters and the scenes to create the appropriate atmosphere. The video of the actual game showed us how different pitches could affect the atmosphere of the game. The images were also very beautiful.

I could not go to the US, but the program was a good experience for me. I was really glad to participate in this program and work hard with these members. In the future, I would like to make great use of these experiences.

When this program started, I was not very good at speaking English. There were three reasons. First, I was not good at expressing myself, because I did not have any skills or hobbies that I felt be proud of. Second, I did not have the English skills to communicate anything to others in English. And the most important reason was that I was afraid of making mistakes.

At first, I was reluctant to participate in English conversation lessons given once a month by a foreign instructor. However, as the number of lessons increased, I gradually became accustomed to English. I had not had many opportunities to speak English with my friends before, but through this program I was able to experience it a lot. I realized that if I worried about every mistake I made, I would never be able to have a fast-paced conversation. This program has helped me to ease my fear of making mistakes.

Also, by trying to explain things that I could express in Japanese but were difficult to express in English using my own vocabulary, I was able to form connections between words. In this process, I think I developed the ability to look at a single issue from multiple perspectives and to communicate this to others.

In this program, I attended three talks in English. One was by a researcher on dinosaurs, another was with a Japanese student living in the U.S. who had various experiences abroad, and the third was by a developer of popular video games. I was able to hear stories that I would not normally hear, such as the joy of pursuing one's own interests, the pleasure of living in a different world, and the fulfillment of creating something that makes people happy. It was a very valuable experience.

In all three of the talks, I was very disappointed in my inability to translate what I wanted to ask into English, and in my inability to fully understand what the other participants in the talks said. These desires to understand what was being said and to know what kind of world exists on this planet motivated me to learn English.

Today, I am still not very good at speaking English. However, I believe that it was my experience in this program that motivated me to make an effort to improve my English speaking ability. I would like to make the most of this experience and continue my efforts from now on.

What I Learned From the Program

I have experienced many things that I would not normally learn or be able to do through this program.

The first is that I was able to communicate a lot in English. The class took two hours, and I had never had conversations in English for such a long time, sometimes it was really hard work for me. At first I sometimes felt frustrated because I could not understand what the teachers were saying, I could not translate what I wanted to say into English, or I saw other students speaking English more fluently than I did. However, over the course of the classes, I began to somewhat understand the English accents of the teachers, which made the time more enjoyable. The teachers had many unique topics, so they were really worthwhile for me.

Second, I had the opportunity to talk with people from companies around the world. I believe this was an experience that I could only have gained in this program. To make appointments with companies, we had to write emails in English. I didn't know how to write emails officially, we had to research and think about the contents, which was considered the perfect distance from the company. Fortunately, we could have three talk sessions, and all of them were so precious and interesting.

The first talk session was about dinosaurs. Since I didn't know much about dinosaurs, it was difficult to understand what he said (he said many technical terms), but thanks to the slides he made, I could understand a little bit of it. The second talk session was held by Ms. Ikarashi Yuka, a student at MIT. She told us about life in the U.S and answered our questions. She told her story to us in a way that was very easy to understand and relatable to us high school students.

The last talk session, which was the most impressive to me, was produced by Mr. Ritsu Mizutani, and Mr. Jenova Chen, members of 'thatgamecompany', a game company which created "Sky: Children of the Light". They told us about that game, the concept of it, and the techniques which are used in the game. Also they asked us some questions since we were players of it, I was so lucky and honored to answer those questions. Furthermore, Mr. Mizutani can speak Japanese, and he helped us to have deeper conversations with Mr. Chen.

Those talk sessions were completely beyond my knowledge, so they expanded my horizons and my desire to work internationally became much stronger.

I have gained a lot of valuable experience, and I hope to make the most of this experience in the future.
